What skills did I gain through National History Day? Showcasing the tangible skills you've gained from extracurricular activities will set your application apart.


Think about the parts of your project that were the most difficult for you. Was it writing? Researching? Learning to navigate editing software? You probably got much better at them while completing your project.

- Research

Top Tips for Preparing Your College Applications

- 1. Always know your deadlines!
 Being late never makes a good first impression. By getting your application in early, you give admissions officers a chance to look over your application before the rush of applications that come in at the last possible minute.
 - 2. Work on your application for a few minutes every day.

This goes hand in hand with the first tip. College applications are definitely not something you should wait until the night before to get started on. Working on your application for a few minutes every day will make the editing process so much easier. It also allows you gain a fresh perspective on your application every time you sit down to work on it.

3. Visit the campus.

Visiting the campus shows admissions officers that you're truly interested in the school. Besides, if you're going to be spending the next few years there, you might as well make sure you like it! If you're applying to several schools that are long-distance, visiting all of them can add up. While it's always best to visit the campus in person, ask the admissions office if they have a virtual tour available on their website. Many schools do!

4. Ask both friends and strangers for critiques.

If you're having trouble describing yourself or what makes you unique, ask a friend or family member!

It's often helpful to get an outside perspective on how people see your qualities compared with how you see them. While it's helpful to ask people who know you, it's also helpful to ask someone who doesn't! Ask a teacher or a friend of your parents who doesn't know you very well to critique your essay. Ask them what they learned about you from your essay and what stood out to them.

5. PROOFREAD!

You can never proofread enough! Have a teacher or parent proofread as well, just for good measure.

6. Be honest and be proud of who you are.

The last and most important tip! Don't write your essay based on what you think admissions officers want to read. Write about something you're passionate about and it will show! Be honest about who you are and the right school will see that you're the perfect fit.
